Robert J. McCann was born in Pittsburgh, PA, and is a third-generation Irish American with roots in County Armagh. He holds dual Irish and American citizenship, embodying the enduring connection between Ireland and New York City. Serving as a bridge between his ancestral homeland and the city that shaped his professional life, he is President of the Irish Arts Center's Board of Directors. In this role, Mr. McCann has been instrumental in promoting and preserving Irish culture in New York, particularly through the Center's transformative growth, which led to the opening of a \$60 million new facility in 2021 and redevelopment plans for its original building.

Professionally, Mr. McCann has played a significant role in strengthening New York's position as a global financial capital through leadership positions at three distinct financial services firms. As President of Global Wealth Management at Merrill Lynch and later as CEO of UBS Americas, he led organizations employing thousands and contributing greatly to the city's economic vitality. Today, as an investor and Co-Chairman of NewEdge Capital Group, Mr. McCann continues to impact the financial landscape of the New York metropolitan area while also championing the vibrant Irish-American cultural community that has been central to the city's identity for generations.

# Patrick J. Ryder

## 2026 Irishman of the Year

### GCUES Aide to the Grand Marshal

Patrick J. Ryder, was appointed Acting Police Commissioner of the Nassau County Police Department on July 20, 2017. He was formally sworn in as Police Commissioner on February 26, 2018.

Commissioner Ryder's distinguished law enforcement career commenced with the New York City Police Department on January 4, 1984. Subsequently, he joined the Nassau County Police Department on July 18, 1986, and was assigned to the 3rd Precinct. In 1989, he was transferred to the Bureau of Special Operations. In 1995, he was promoted to Sergeant and assigned to the 5th Precinct, 8th Squad, and the Asset Forfeiture Unit (AFU) as the Deputy Commanding Officer.

In 2008, he was designated as the Commanding Officer of Asset Forfeiture & Intelligence (AFI). During his tenure, he proactively implemented several life-saving programs and initiatives that significantly contributed to ensuring officer and public safety. These initiatives include the Nassau County Police Department's Real-Time Intelligence (RTI) system, the R.E.A.C.H. Program, the Civilian Intelligence Analyst Program, the DNA Collection Initiative, and the establishment of the Counter-Terrorism Unit, Think Tank, and the Department's Criminal Intelligence Rapid Response Team (CIRRT). Collectively, these initiatives have substantially reduced crime. Nassau County was recently ranked as the safest county in America in 2025, continuing its reputation for low crime rates and effective law enforcement.

Commissioner Ryder holds a Master's Degree in Homeland Security and Management from Long Island University. He is an Adjunct Professor of Criminal Justice and Intelligence-Led Policing at Nassau Community College and previously taught at Dowling College. Currently, he serves on the Advisory Board for Criminal Justice at SUNY Farmingdale and has been a Counter-Terrorism Lecturer at the University of Maryland Center for Health and Homeland Security.

Patrick's parents, Seamus and Kathleen Ryder, were newly wed when they arrived in New York City in 1955 from County Dublin, Ireland. Like many of the new Irish immigrant families, they settled in Queens. Subsequently, Seamus and Kathleen relocated east for a better life in Lynbrook, New York, where they raised six children.

Patrick and his wife Jill have three children: Liam, Sean, and Meghan.

Francis (Frank) J. Sheridan, Jr., was born in Brooklyn, NY to Frank and Marie Sheridan, both of whom were of Irish descent (Counties Cavan and Galway, approximately 1820 And 1850). Growing up in the small community of Garritsen Beach, Frank lived with his parents, his grandmother, his two older brothers, one younger brother and his seven sisters. Frank was the 10th of 11 children. Frank always had a strong commitment to family, community, and his Irish heritage. Frank attended Resurrection R.C. grade school in Gerritsen Beach, and then Sheepshead Bay High School. After graduating from high school, his parents sold their home on Knapp St. in Brooklyn and moved to Ticonderoga, New York. Ticonderoga was a special place for the Sheridan family as every year during the last two weeks of August, this is where the family would go on for a family vacation.

In October 1978, Frank joined the United States Air Force shortly after moving to Ticonderoga. Frank was an Air Force security policeman assigned to the 91st Missile Security Squadron at Minot Air Force Base in North Dakota.

After separating from the Air Force in 1982 as a Staff Sergeant, Frank joined the United Nations Security Police at the New York headquarters. In 1984, Frank began his court system career as a court officer assigned to the Appellate Term of the New York State Supreme Court in Brooklyn. Under the guidance of former Chief Clerks Jack Cahill and Nancy Sunshine, Frank rose through the ranks. In 2007, Frank was promoted to Court Clerk Specialist, working as the Deputy Commissioner and Chief of Operations in the King's County Clerk's office for former Celts Grand Marshall, Kings County Clerk/Commissioner of Jurors, Honorable Nancy T. Sunshine, Esq. In December 2025 Frank was promoted to Chief Deputy County Clerk and Deputy Commissioner of Jurors for the Kings County Clerk/Commissioner of Jurors office.

Frank and his wife Lorraine, have two sons and their spouses, Gregory Patrick (Hillary Jordan) and Sean Ryan (Danise Pimpinella). As a dad and an active member of the Marine Park Community, and an active member of St. Columba parish, Frank has been a volunteer coach for his children at football, baseball, basketball, and hockey. In addition to coaching his sons for Saint Columba Youth Council, Frank has been active for the last 35 years in running the Youth Council sports program for over 1500 boys and girls. Frank's love and dedication to his family is evident to all who know him, and this is true of his court family as well. ## Father Brendan Fitzgerald

Fr. Brendan Ahern Fitzgerald is one of four sons born to Esther and Denis Fitzgerald, both natives of County Kerry, Ireland. Growing up, Fr. Brendan attended high school in Ireland and spent his summers in the Rockaways, NY. After completing his secondary education at St. Brendan's College, Killarney, Fr. Fitzgerald entered St Patrick's Seminary, Maynooth, in County Kildare, Ireland, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree and then spent a pastoral year working with Mother Theresa in Calcutta. Fr. Fitzgerald went on to continue his academic formation in Rome, where he graduated with a Master's in Theology. He continued his studies at Fordham University, where he earned a Master's and an A.P.D. in Education. In 2000, Fr. Fitzgerald was ordained a priest at St. John's Cathedral, Limerick, Ireland. He spent his first year of priesthood in Meelick, County Clare, and was then appointed a Diocesan Advisor for Education for the Diocese of Limerick. Fr. Fitzgerald held this position for five years before returning to New York to work as a Parochial Vicar in Saint Barnabas Parish the Bronx, from 2006 to 2009.

He then spent a brief period as Parochial Vicar at St. Margaret of Cortona, Riverdale, before being appointed priest secretary to His Eminence Edward Cardinal Egan. In 2012, Fr. Fitzgerald was appointed Pastor of Regina Coeli, Hyde Park, NY, and in 2016, Pastor of Saint Barnabas in the Bronx. Fr Brendan Fitzgerald is Chaplain to, the FDNY Emerald Society, as well as the FDNY Holy Name Society, FDNY G.A.A., United Emerald Societies, AOH Division 5, the New York GAA, as well as Chaplain of the NY Kerry. Association. Since 2018, Fr. Fitzgerald annually celebrates a mass in Gaelic and it has become a national AOH event. In 2022, Fr. Fitzgerald was honored with the 'The Sprit of 1916' Award by Bronx County AOH. He served as the Bronx County Aide to the Grand Marshal, Michael Benn, in the NYC Saint Patrick's Day Parade on March 17, 2025.

In his final assignment, Kevin served as Commanding Officer of the Citywide Missing Person Squad within the Special Investigations Division. He oversaw crucial cases involving missing individuals throughout New York City. His leadership helped ensure diligent and professional investigations, providing closure for families and communities. Kevin retired from the NYPD on November 28, 2018.

Kevin has actively participated in both professional and community organizations. He served as President of the NYPD Manhattan, Bronx, and Staten Island Holy Name Society. He is a member and former delegate of the NYPD Emerald Society, and is also affiliated with the Police Anchor Club, the Knights of Columbus George W. Hudson Council, and the Fraternal Order of Police Stephen P. Driscoll Memorial Lodge #704.

Kevin resides in Kent, New York, Putnam County, with his wife Sheila (née Tierney), who is from Woodside, Queens. Sheila's parents, Gerald and Ann Tierney (née Reilly), are originally from Ballyhaise and Cootehill in County Cavan. He is currently a System Director with the WMC/Bon Secours Charity Health System and is a consultant in investigative and security operations, creative and educational projects.

# Dennis J. Schock

Dennis J. Schock has devoted his life and career to serving, protecting, and advancing the dedicated men and women of the New York City Department of Sanitation and the Uniformed Sanitationmen's Association, Local 831.

Born in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, to Robert E. Schock and Mary Schock—both of proud Irish descent—Dennis's family's American journey began in 1890 when his paternal grandparents emigrated from Kilkenny, Ireland. They initially settled in Bangor, Maine, before establishing their roots in Williamsburg, Brooklyn.

Mary Schock was the matriarch of an extraordinary family of nine children—two born in Ireland and seven in the United States—who dedicated their lives to public service as civil servants, police officers, firefighters, and sanitation workers. Their commitment to service exemplifies the classic and enduring route to the American middle class.

Deeply connected to his Irish heritage, Dennis J. Schock has been an active member of the Emerald Society for thirty-nine years. During this time, he has served with distinction as Vice President and currently sits on the Board of Directors. For thirty-five years, he has also proudly played the bagpipes as a member of the Emerald Society Pipe and Drums, participating in numerous cultural and commemorative events.

In further reflection of his lifelong commitment to Irish heritage and fellowship, he holds the Major Degree in the Ancient Order of Hibernians (AOH), Division 7.

Dennis J. Schock's life is a testament to legacy, tradition, and leadership—honoring both his family's immigrant roots and his unwavering dedication to community and culture.

Dennis began his career with the Department of Sanitation on March 21, 1987, proudly starting as a Sanitation Worker. Just over a year later, his leadership qualities shone through when he was elected Shop Steward. On June 29, 1988, he advanced to the role of Union Delegate, marking the beginning of decades of dedicated union advocacy.

On December 1, 2001, he furthered his leadership journey by being appointed Business Agent of Queens West, representing members with fairness, integrity, and a profound understanding of union values.

His strong voice for the membership and steadfast commitment to labor rights led to additional responsibilities within the union. On June 5, 2010, Dennis was elected Vice President of Local 831, where he served with distinction, always prioritizing the needs, safety, and dignity of the workforce.

Throughout his career, Dennis has remained grounded by the values instilled in him by his parents, Robert and Mary. He is supported in all his endeavors by his wife, Bernadette, and is a proud father to two sons, Michael and Matthew, who share his pride in public service and commitment to the labor movement.

As a long-standing delegate of the Grand Council of United Emerald Societies, he served as President for two terms. Currently, he is on the New York City St Patrick's Day Parade and Celebration Committee, a role he has held for the past 10 years.
